Roddy's Eco-Cover is a community-based organisation founded in 2011 to champion environmental awareness with forestry as key concern.

Agro forestry work will include tree planting, preparation of tree nurseries and weeding. Cultural learning coupled with home visits for exposure to development challenges with study theme: Youth Entrepreneurship and Leadership Development. Volunteers will stay in a homestead within the community with basic living conditions. Possibility to visit the historic sites like Hippo point on Lake Victoria in Kisumu City, renowned Kakamega Rain Forest and the Equator point at Maseno University;

NETHERLANDS Counter NATO!

Topic: Peace and disarmament

8 volunteers

This is a work and study camp. A coalition of peace organisations in the Netherlands, together with the international No-to-NATO coalition decided to organise a counter-summit in The Hague in 21-22 June just before the NATO summit. Joined in by VIA the volunteers will support the counter-summit (aim: 250 participants) and the demonstration (aim: 1000 pax) with a logistical support camp, and prepare banners and creative action-formats for the weekend. The study theme will mainly take place before the counter-summit weekend and consists of a variety of workshops: new security thinking, the NATO war strategy and responses to that, arms trade, directions for the peace movement and of course the role of SCI in that spectrum.

IMPORTANT: The counter summit will take place BEFORE the NATO summit itself. Volunteers will be mainly carrying out logistical tasks. there might be repression by the local police. Not likely, but one never knows and volunteers should be aware of it!

SRI LANKA Sustainable Roots through Language Skill Development and Organic Farming

Topic: Environment protection Work Types: Environment/Language study/Peace

10 volunteers Child friendly camp (Minimum age: 11)

SCI Sri Lanka working with partner organization Like, The T.E.A. Project(Training, Empowerment, Awareness) which works to empower Sri Lankan children from poverty. The T.E.A. Project Centre for Children's Empowerment supports disadvantaged children & young people from poor tea plantation communiTEAs.

Work will be preparation of vegetable beds and nursery beds for organic farming, Repairing the water source, the fence and the wall cupboards in the centre, Building outdoor kitchen, Cleaning outside well and Teaching English. This hand-on activity will provide the study focus on Sustainable Community Development and Environmental Education. Participants will stay in a centre with basic living condition and shared sleeping spaces are separated for males and females. The main spoken languages during the camp will be English but local languages are Tamil/Sinhalese. Volunteers should be physically fit and adaptable, with a passion for sustainability and organic farming. Location: Kandy is located in Central Province

Topic: Children and youth Work Types: Teaching

10 volunteers

Phikulthong School is a small Buddhist school in Phatthalung province, Southern Thailand. The camp will provide the chance for the students to improve their English by using the language in real life with foreign volunteers. Here you can experience the locals' way of life, exchange your culture with other volunteers and villagers, support the children's education and also provide non-formal English classes and other fun activities for the students, create teaching materials for teachers and kids 3: Volunteers should prepare some teaching materials and lessons plans to create activities that will enhance values of respect and cooperation among students and volunteers.

The camp will sleep on mats on the classroom floor. Very few to no people in the village can speak good English. Learning basic Thai and body language will be necessary.

Extra fee to be paid in the hosting country: 9500 Thai Baht

Alliance Conference and Technical Meeting,

With the merger of IVS and VAP the combined organisation is now a member of several international networks. Notably SCI, but also the Alliance of European Voluntary Service Organisations, an International Non-Governmental Youth Organisation that represents national organisations which promote intercultural education, understanding and peace through voluntary service.

The Secretariat of the Alliance is based in Istanbul, hosted by a Turkish member organisation, and here is a report on the annual technical meeting of Alliance, held in Serbia.

Zrenjanin, Serbia, 18-22 February 2025

Beautifully hosted by the Young Researchers of Serbia, the Alliance annual gathering for their 'Technical Meeting' was preceded by a one-day conference with workshops on the theme of long and medium term volunteering. The conference seamlessly ran on to the four-day Technical Meeting with a timetable of various issues, workshops and bilaterals.



This was my first Alliance Technical Meeting. However I recognised its origins from my experience with CMP (Christian Movement for Peace) some forty years ago, in the time before internet communication, each spring representatives of volunteering organisations would meet to advertise and exchange their programmes of short term, 'workcamp' volunteering for the ensuing season. Echoes of that past survive in the one-to-one bilateral meetings in which special relationships between two organisations are begun, developed and sustained.

I feel I gained much from attending. Here are some thoughts and highlights:

 The Alliance is an avowedly European grouping with membership of the European Youth Forum. Nevertheless there are both full members and partners to be found in countries outside Europe. Some workshops and sessions discussed the organisation's internal structure and the terms of membership and partnership. I did not involve myself with these as there were always alternatives for me to attend of relevance to IVS-VAP.

- Sadly, many delegates were missing as Serbia had refused visas to all delegates from Africa and several from Asia, including India, Nepal, Vietnam. Most of these I count as personal friends from CCIVS events, as were those present from South Korea, Hong Kong, Taiwan and Japan. Adli from IPYL (International Palestinian Youth League) attended, also for the first time.
- It became clear to me that Alliance staff and members produce some high-quality work. An example came in the workshop on LGBTQIA+ agenda on which they have worked this past year, producing a series of detailed 'posters' on a full range of issues that arise. There was nothing with which I could find fault. However a valid point raised in the meeting was that the very detail and complexity made the posters unsuitable as an advocacy tool. Something simpler and more direct was required to be of use in our projects where the aim was to get people thinking and talking openly in a stress free atmosphere.



- An excellent workshop on LMTV mentoring was led by the delegation from Finland.
 There is a three-way relationship to be managed with our volunteers at Othona. We need to ensure that our mentors have an understanding of both host and volunteer.
- A superb presentation from VolTra, Hong Kong, linking LMTV with sustainable environmental lifestyles.
- Bilateral meetings were useful for me to explain how VAP is now subsumed within IVS and how the VAP service would remain with our existing partners. With SJ (Societe Jeunesse) they were able to confirm that once they heard from Nuno that Othona was open to receive another pair of volunteers they would apply to the French Government for funding. They warned that it could be a matter of months before funds came through and they were able to recruit, so even if notification came soon, it was unlikely volunteers could start at Othona before next autumn. Also in a bilateral, an illuminating discussion with the delegate from Kharkiv, Ukraine.

- Unfortunately their website is now well out of date. I nevertheless learned much from what I found at Alliance of European Voluntary Service Organisations -Voluntary Workcamps
- A final thought, but one requiring further thinking. Post Brexit our position within the
 international community can feel a very lonely place. We have to decide with which
 international networks we wish to work most closely and the nature of such
 membership, partnership, activism as is appropriate.

In advance of my travels, friends had warned me that Serbia was in a state of some turmoil. While that in no way impinged on a peaceful week at Zrenjanin, I encountered the situation staying with friends in Novi Sad for a few days immediately before and immediately after, the conference.

Disturbances which spread throughout Serbia, had been triggered on 1st November 2024 by the tragic collapse at recently refurbished Novi Sad railway station, of a concrete canopy, killing fifteen people. The building, currently unused, stands close to the city's bus station where I met up with Egyesek friends arriving from Budapest, to take the local bus for Zrenjanin.

With my Novi Sad friend I toured the Novi Sad university campus. Silent, almost deserted, academic activity suspended, posters and banners demanded answers, made accusations. Another day, as we went from our apartment near the city centre toward the main transport hub, we observed coming towards us across the full width of one side of the dual carriageway main boulevard, a vast silent crowd, advancing on the Vojvadina Province Government building. The solid throng stretched back in a slow moving several hundred-metre-long funereal march.

Serbia has much to resolve.

IVS partner Othona, Essex, invites us to join them at their community centre, Bradwell on Sea for a full on Green Celebration weekend at the end of May. Essex Green Weekend | Othona Essex



At the time of writing there still appears to be space available to stay at the centre. However note there are alternative options of camping on site or finding other accommodation locally. If your time is limited make just a day of it, driving to the lonely Essex coast or taking a train from Liverpool Street or Stratford, and changing at Wickford for the Southminster shuttle. From Southminster Station a bus or taxi is necessary to complete the journey.

This will be the fourth occasion of what is becoming a regular annual event. Sponsored by Essex mental health charity TrustLinks, <u>Green Weekend 2025 - Trust Links</u> the weekend blends joyful festivities with learning and deliberation of the serious issues facing the sea shore, countryside, nation and world.

Founded in 1946, it is thought that Othona welcomed IVS participation as long ago as 1948. Volunteer Action for Peace (VAP) and its predecessors have held annual summer workcamps at Othona, certainly since the early eighties and possibly from one or two decades before that.

Please, if you do go, introduce yourself as a member of the international volunteering community, to Winnie. In 2022 Winnie came from Hong Kong to participate in the VAP summer workcamp at Othona. This April she will take up a place as a member of the core community.

Update on Merger IVS and VAP

At the 2024 AGMs of both IVS and VAP it was agreed that the two charities would merge and this would be put into effect by Volunteer Action for Peace becoming a department of International Voluntary Service GB. Since then work has been going on in conjunction with the Charity Commission to finalise the VAP accounts and close down that charity, with any assets being transferred to IVS.

Preliminary Notice for IVS AGM 2025

In accordance with the Byelaws, notice is given that IVS will be holding its Annual General Meeting on Saturday 14 June 2025. It is hoped that the meeting can be a blend of in-person, at the Alan Baxter Gallery, Cowcross Street near Farringdon station in central London, and on-line presence. For a resolution to be considered by the AGM it must be received by the Chair, in writing, at least six weeks before the AGM

Nominations are also sought for people to stand for the Board. Three members will be coming to the end of their current term. Members can also be co-opted to the Board for a period of up to one year. The AGM is open to members of IVS and of VAP and there will be a progress report on the merger of the two organisations. More details about the IVS AGM, including venue, nominations and any other resolutions will be circulated to members of both organisations nearer the time.
